even as psychology becomes increasingly splintered and specialized as evidenced by the growing number of special interest divisions of the american psychological association many psychologists are devoting their energies to finding commonalities between traditionally distinct fields and building bridges between them developmental psychopathology for example has emerged as a synthesis of child development theory and clinical child psychology health psychology has resulted from the cooperation and collaboration of many psychologists from a number of fields including clinical counseling social developmental and physiological within clinical psychology is a growing movement toward rapprochement that is dedicated to finding common themes among seemingly disparate approaches to psychotherapy thus integration among different fields has increased even as diversity in psychology has flourished one such integration or interfacing effort that is related in several ways to the integrative efforts just noted involves social clinical and counseling psychology although this effort is not a new one see chapter 1 it was given a new lease on life by the publication of the first issue of the journal of social and clinical psychology in 1983 since that time several volumes and numerous journal articles and book chapters have been devoted to the general notion that social psychological theory and research has much to offer clinical and counseling psychology such as greater understanding of psychological and everyday problems in living and insight into clinical and counseling activities such as psychotherapy

assessment has always played an important role in counseling this book provides information about the various psychological assessment procedures that are relevant for practicing counselors the text deals with the use of tests that are most often employed by counselors and it includes case studies its purpose is to help counselors become better consumers and interpreters of psychological and educational tests and assessment procedures it emphasizes the selection interpretation and communication of psychological test results and also details the importance of integrating test results with other information about the client it is not designed to be a text book or desk manual on the various tests themselves the first four chapters introduce the reader to basic concepts in psychological assessment and to the statistical knowledge needed to select and interpret tests chapters 5 through 15 constitute the bulk of the book here over 100 tests and other assessment measures are examined the assessments are divided into three categories cognitive career and life planning and personality in chapters 16 through 18 professional practices and considerations are explored including analyses of cultural bias communication of test results and ethical and social issues in testing contains roughly 500 references and a comprehensive index rjm

the primary purpose of this revision remains identical to that of the first edition to show how key personality cognitive behavioral and vocational tests assessment procedures can be used by counselors in their work with clients too often assessment books only provide the reader with information about tests and assessment procedures they do not however take the next step showing readers how these tests assessment procedures can be used and integrated into the actual work of counseling this revision is designed to fill that void chapter authors all of whom are experts in their respective topic areas share the theoretical and research backgrounds about a particular test assessment procedure and then provide a case example or examples to show how assessment data can be meaningfully incorporated into the counseling process

this book is primarily for psychology students a text for a first course in counseling procedures for persons expecting to work in colleges or high schools the book is written from the point of view of different problems rather than from that of the specialist in vocational guidance marriage counseling or psychotherapy it tries to stress common principles underlying many types of counseling activity rather than to outline special methods for each
